October is Clergy Appreciation Month. Why do we need a special month to appreciate our pastor and church staff? Are they so insecure they need constant affirmation? That kind of question is like the man who says, "I told my wife I love her when we got married. If that ever changes I'll let her know." We all know how well that works.

Let me quote from a church newsletter of a friend of mine.

"Numerous surveys have found that a very high percentage of ministers feel pressure to have an 'ideal family', to be the ideal role model of a perfect Christian family, which is impossible, of course. As a result, four out of five ministers feel their families are negatively impacted by unrealistic expectations – whether self imposed or congregation imposed - and that ministry is a downright hazard to the health of their families. Indeed 'the pedestal' is not all it's cracked up to be. There is also the 'fish bowl' aspect of the ministrv, whereby the entire lives of the pastoral families seem to be on public display. Anxiety is heightened when financial pressures also come to bear. Beloved, believe me: no one would chose

to live under these conditions unless they felt obliged to a higher, divine directive."

Do something tangible to let your pastor, worship leader, youth pastor and other church staff members know that you love them, appreciate them and respect them as a chosen man of God.

For nearly four months, PCSW has been assisting Pastor Joshua Bencomo, a local El Paso pastor. In May, he suffered a hairInfracture of his left arm when he fell walking off the church platform. And, he had no insurance. Another pastor, who learned of his situation contacted me, we contacted Joshua and in a few days made arrangements with an orthopedic surgeon who began treating

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him. Now, after months of office visits, x-rays, and physical therapy sessions, Pastor Bencomo's arm is almost as good as new. We are most often involved with hurting pastors through mentoring and counseling or connecting them with professional counselors or retreat centers or often just letting them talk while we listen. But on occasion, what is needed is practical, hands on assistance.


